

Coconut Lane Drainage Project

The Town has contracted with Tenex Inc. to construct a drainage structure at the western end of Coconut Lane in the cul-de-sac. The purpose of the structure is to eliminate, as best we can, the flooding which presently occurs during heavy rains and high tides.

They will begin construction in January and should be done by June. At times they will be moving large dump trucks on the street but not often. However, when they do they will need enough room so please ask you landscapers to keep as close to the side as possible as some of their vehicles are rather wide.

Soliciting On The Rise

As I indicated last month (and the list of Criminal Activity shows), the annual migration of solicitors has begun. The colder weather in the North has driven these folks to our more temperate climate. As a result, these entrepreneurs have been going door-to-door soliciting funds for magazine subscriptions, bogus sports teams (lacrosse, “Irish” soccer, baseball, etc.), and other causes.

The good news is residents have been calling the Police Department to report these visitors and/or suspicious persons, and these calls are greatly appreciated. Our initial response was to meet with & identify the violators, issue them & their company warnings and, as long as they did not have a warrant, send them on their way. It was apparent that a stronger message was needed so arrests began.

Again, it is important to note that our investigations determined that several of these folks have warrants and/or criminal histories, and their companies have had numerous Better Business Bureau complaints filed against them.

Soliciting without a Permit is a Town Code violation. Please continue to call us when you encounter or observe suspicious persons. Your continued support is greatly appreciated.

Golf Cart Battery Chargers

During December, ORPD investigated numerous thefts of golf cart battery chargers; all but one in Briny Breezes. These items appear to be valuable resources of scrap copper and/or are being sold on the Internet.

These thefts are crimes of opportunity. Valuables left outside are prime targets. Please be aware and secure your property.

If you see suspicious activity or persons, please do not delay in calling the Police. Time is of the essence, and a reduced response time may result in thwarting a crime and/or an immediate apprehension.

New 9-1-1 Equipment Installed

On Wednesday, 12/14/11, the County’s new “Next Generation 9-1-1” telephone equipment was activated in the ORPD Dispatch Center. Our agency was the tenth to “go live” in Palm Beach County. The funding for this project is from a State grant.

As a designated Public Safety Answering Point, we are authorized to receive emergency calls (i.e.: requests for police, fire, and/or medical response). As such, our response time is reduced and we are able to render aid more quickly. The new equipment will eventually be able to take advantage of current and future technological capabilities; such as, receiving information via text messaging, video download, etc.

New Computer-Aided Dispatch/Record Management System Put in Service

The close of 2011 marked the replacement of an outdated Records Management System and the implementation of the Police Department’s first Computer-Aided Dispatch program. The new equipment was purchased by combining Budgeted funds, a \$20,000 donation from the Ocean Ridge Department of Public Safety Support Group, Inc. and a nearly \$10,000 donation from Town residents Al Naar & Judy Kelly.

The new CAD/RMS software went live at Midnight on New Year’s. When combined with the laptop computers in the Police vehicles and the new 9-1-1 system, our capabilities are greatly enhanced.

**Energy2Save Reduces Energy; Saves Money
Rebate Program Launches Dec. 12**

Do you have old, energy-draining products that you can never seem to find the time to replace? On Dec. 12, the Municipal Energy Conservation Coalition (MECC) is making it easier and less expensive for you through an Energy Conservation Rebate Program. The Program, called Energy2Save, is designed to raise awareness and help motivate you and our community to take action on energy conservation practices that reduce greenhouse gases and energy use.

Rebates, and the associated rebate amounts, will be provided for the replacement and installation of the following items:

Programmable Thermostat	Up to \$30
Air conditioning unit	\$125 to \$2,100
Air ducts	Up to \$154
Insulation	Up to \$300
Solar Water Heater	Up to \$1,000
Reflective Roof Covering	Up to \$325

But there is even more good news. Qualifying residents that are approved through the Florida Power & Light Rebate Program may be eligible to receive additional rebate money. However, the combined rebate amount may not exceed the total cost paid for the product.

How does it work?

Beginning Dec. 12, you may complete and submit an application through the Energy2Save.com website. You may also download an application and mail it to the location indicated on the application. Before you apply, make sure you read the qualifications to be sure that you are eligible. After your application is approved, you may purchase and install one of the energy efficient products. After installation, you must submit the required documentation within the appropriate timeframe and your rebate will be mailed to you. It's that simple!

Other restrictions apply, but the minimum requirements include:

- Must own and reside in a single-family home, townhouse, or condo, within the program area where the energy efficient product will be installed.
- Must be a Florida Power and Light (FPL) account holder at the residents that you are installing the rebate products.
- Application must be **completed, submitted and approved** before the applicant may purchase the energy efficient product for which they wish to seek a rebate.
- Applicant is solely responsible for the purchase and installation of rebate-eligible products and all related parts, permits, equipment, and adherence to all building codes, deed restrictions, homeowner's association organization restrictions, and other applicable ordinances, codes and restrictions.
- Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis, and are subject to the availability of funds, or until the program is terminated.

MECC is a partnership comprised of the Towns of Lantana, Ocean Ridge, Haverhill, Palm Beach Shores and the City of Atlantis. The program is funded through a grant provided by the State Energy Efficiency Conservation.

Oceanfront Park Beach Passes

Residents seeking beach passes to Oceanfront Park can purchase them at the City of Boynton Beach's City Hall (Mon-Thu, 7am-6pm) and at Intracoastal Park Clubhouse (Tue-Sat, 10am-2pm). Fee is \$40. Please bring required documents: 1) Current vehicle registration for each vehicle), 2) Proof of residency (ie. Phone bill, FPL bill, water bill—postmarked within two months or property deed or lease agreement – min 6mos).

Non-residents seeking a seasonal beach pass may purchase beginning May 1 at the Intracoastal Clubhouse only. This pass is good from May 1 to November 15. Fee is \$90. Please show proof of vehicle registration.



Leash Laws

For your animal's safety and the safety of your neighbors, please remember to secure your pets by a collar and leash when you are walking them off of your property, around the Town, and especially on Old Ocean Blvd where pedestrian traffic is very heavy. Unleashed pets violates Sec. 4 of the Palm Beach County Ordinance No. 98-22 that reads:

- 1) It shall be unlawful for any dog to be off the owner's property (which property is exclusive to the owner and does not include common areas) unless the dog is under the restraint or control of a person by means of a chain, leash or other is sufficiently near its handler to be under his direct control and is obedient to that handler's commands or is caged/crated.
- 2) It shall be unlawful for an owner to tie, chain, tether or confine by electronic/radio device a dog on the owner's property within five (5) feet of public property, public access, easements, common grounds or the property of another without the consent of the owner of such property.


