

Municipal Election Information

The 2016 Municipal Election will be held on Tuesday, March 15, 2016, coinciding with the Presidential Primary Election handled by the PBC Supervisor of Elections. Polls will be open from 7:00AM to 7:00PM in the Town Hall community room. Lynn Allison (incumbent) and Steve Coz qualified as candidates for the one open seat prior to the Dec. 8th deadline. The qualifying period was earlier this year due to the federal and state requirements relating to absentee ballot mailing requirements. Solid Waste Collection

Solid waste is collected on Tuesdays and Fridays. Garbage including bulk items and vegetation is collected on Tuesdays only. Garbage and recycling is collected on Fridays only.

As per Chapter 42 in the Town's Code of Ordinances, it is unlawful for any person to place any solid waste or any obstruction of any kind upon any street, sidewalk, alley, park, lane or other public grounds of the town or upon any publicly dedicated right-of-way or on the land of another without his consent, except that properly containerized garbage, waste and yard trash may be placed no greater than six feet from the street or road abutting the property generating the subject garbage, waste or yard trash to effectuate proper municipal refuse, garbage and yard trash collection. All waste will be properly containerized and placed in an orderly fashion.

Yard trash shall consist of vegetation only, including, but not limited to grass clippings, bush or tree trimmings, leaves, and weeds, and shall be placed near the street no sooner than 36 hours, or the Sunday prior to the regularly scheduled day of collection. Yard trash (other than normal weekly vegetation) generated by lawn care companies will not be collected by the Town's trash collector and should be properly removed by the vendor who generated it. March's Regular Town Commission Meeting Summary

Turtle Season Begins March 1



Turtle season begins on March 1st and ends on October 31st. Throughout the season, Ocean Ridge Tidings will provide you with interesting and informative turtle updates from Palm Beach County Environmental Resources Management. In addition, there are flyers and small table top signs available at town hall for residents, condo and homeowner's associations to hand out. Supplies are limited.

Three sea turtle species (the endangered green and leatherback and the threatened loggerhead) nest in Palm Beach County. Artificial lighting may deter females from nesting and can prevent hatchlings from reaching the water. Beach furniture and other obstacles on the beach may block access to suitable nesting locations.

You can help sea turtles by following these tips:

- * Turn off all non-essential beachfront lighting.
- * Replace incandescent & fluorescent bulbs with red or amber LED bulbs.
- * Reduce lighting visible from the beach by lowering shielding, recessing, and/or redirecting fixtures.
- * Use draperies or blinds to reduce interior lighting.
- * Be turtle friendly by removing chairs, toys, floats, and boats from the beach at night.
- * Replace wooden cabanas with lighter alternatives.

March's Crime Prevention Information From Investigator Richard Jones

IRS PHONE SCAM

Aggressive and threatening phone calls by criminals impersonating IRS agents remain a major threat to taxpayers today.

The Ocean Ridge Police Department has seen a surge of these phone scams as scam artists threaten police arrest, deportation, license revocation and other things. We remind our residents to guard themselves against all sorts of con games that arise during any filing season.

There are many variations. The caller may threaten you with arrest or court action to trick you into making a payment. Some schemes may say you're entitled to a huge refund. These all add up to trouble. Some simple tips can help protect you.

The IRS and the Ocean Ridge Police Department continues working to warn taxpayers about these types of scams.

Scammers typically make unsolicited calls claiming to be IRS officials. They demand that the victim immediately pay a bogus tax bill. They con the victim into sending cash, usually through a prepaid debit card or wire transfer. They may also leave "urgent" callback requests through phone robotic type-calls or via a email.

Many of these scammers use threats to intimidate and bully a victim into paying. They may even threaten to arrest, deport or revoke the license of their victim if they don't get the money.

Scammers often alter caller ID numbers to make it look like the IRS or another agency is calling. The callers use IRS titles and fake badge numbers to appear legitimate. They may use the victim's name, address and other personal information to make the call sound official.

According to the IRS, there are five things that the scammers often do but the IRS will never do. Any one of these five things should alert you of a scam.

The IRS will never:

- Call to demand immediate payment, nor will the agency call about taxes owed without first having mailed you a bill.
- Demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.
- Require you to use a specific payment method for your taxes, such as a prepaid debit card.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Threaten to bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying.

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS and asking for money, here's what you should do:

If you don't owe taxes, or have no reason to think that you do:

- Do not give out any information. Hang up immediately.
- Contact TIGTA to report the call. Use their "[IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting](#)" web page. You can also call 800-366-4484.
- Report it to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "[FTC Complaint Assistant](#)" on FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" in the notes.

If you know you owe, or think you may owe tax: Call the IRS at 800-829-1040. IRS workers can help you.

Recent Crime Trends

As reported for the past several months, we continue to see thefts from unlocked vehicles and cars being stolen using keys that were left inside. Though we have identified many suspects and been successful in making arrests in some cases, **we need your help!**

Please make sure items of value are not left in your vehicle. Lock your car doors. Take your keys in the house. Do not leave spare keys in your vehicle, hidden or otherwise, especially if you wish to leave the car unlocked.

The individuals determined to be responsible for these type crimes are conducting the same acts throughout Palm Beach County. In most cases we have observed (from video collected) that they will leave locked vehicles un-entered and try for an easier target. If everyone makes it more appealing to commit these crimes elsewhere by being vigilant and locking their vehicles, perhaps we can eliminate this type of crime from our community.

Cyber Crime Continues To Be A Threat

Cyber threats affecting you, your family, and members of your community include:

Identity Theft

- Identity theft is the illegal use of someone else's personal information in order to obtain money or credit.
- Identity theft can happen to anyone in any location across the country.
- Take simple steps to protect your online identity by:
 - Locking and password protecting your computer and cell phone.
 - Not sharing specific personal information online, such as your full name or birthday.
 - Setting proper privacy settings on social networking sites.

Fraud and Phishing

- Fraud is the intentional perversion of truth in order to induce another to part with something of value or to surrender a legal right.

- Phishing is a scam by which an email user is duped into revealing personal or confidential information that the scammer can use illicitly or fraudulently.
- Fraud and phishing attacks may take the form of an authentic-looking website or a personalized email.
- Secure yourself from fraud and phishing attacks by:
 - Turning off the option to automatically download attachments.
 - Saving and scanning any attachments before opening them.
 - Before providing any kind of information, call and verify with the source that they are indeed the ones who sent the email.

Cyber Bullying and Ethics

- Cyber bullying is the electronic posting of mean-spirited messages about a person, often done anonymously.
- Cyber ethics help Internet users understand what type of online behavior is right and wrong.
- Cyber bullying and poor cyber ethics are threats many teens and young adults face not from strangers, but from their own peers.
- Whatever anyone posts online about another person can be spread virally, resulting in serious, unwarranted damage to an individual's reputation or personal well-being.
- If you are being bullied, report it to a trusted adult—a parent, teacher or neighbor.
- Avoid being a cyber bully and practice good cyber ethics by:
 - Following the Golden Rule—Be nice online and in real life.
 - Not saying or doing anything online that you wouldn't say or do in person.
 - Owning and taking responsibility for your actions online.

Cyber Predators

- Cyber predators are people who search online for other people in order to use, control, or harm them in some way.
- Cyber predators target teens and young adults—both male and female—on a regular basis, regardless of whether or not the victims are 18 or above.
- Social networking sites enhance a predator's ability to target young Americans, especially if they share personal information in their profile.
- To protect yourself from cyber predators:
 - —Be aware—you never know who is behind the screen, so be protective of yourself and your personal information.
 - —If you are being targeted or harassed online, notify your family or the proper authorities.

Volunteers Needed

Your Anthrax Committee needs volunteers to distribute antibiotics on the remote chance that the Town of Ocean Ridge is exposed to an aerosolized airborne anthrax event. No special knowledge is required. All that is required is attendance at about two hours of meetings per year.

Aerosolized Airborne Anthrax is a bioterrorist weapon. Unfortunately, there have been several anthrax episodes in the United States, including one fatal attack in Palm Beach County in 2001. While death occurs in 50% to virtually all exposed individuals, the disease can be prevented by rapid administration of appropriate antibiotics. It is strongly recommended that everyone be provided and take these antibiotics for his/her protection against exposure.

The Town of Ocean Ridge has signed an Agreement with the Florida Department of Health in Palm Beach County who will provide the needed antibiotics at no cost, as part of a program under the auspices of the Center for Disease and Prevention. We will be a dispensing site for our community. Our own trained and credentialed resident-volunteers will perform the necessary dispensing duties. (In absence of this Agreement other will have to line up at large public dispersal centers.)

You are urgently requested to sign up as a volunteer to assist with this challenge. We plan to have a Training Update very soon and would like to get as many of our residents as possible to share in this important program.


