2011 Municipal Election Results

The results from the Ocean Ridge Municipal Election held on March 8, 2011 are as follows: Betty Bingham with 198 votes, Ed Brookes with 277 votes, and Zoanne Hennigan with 313 votes. Certification of the election results and administering of new oath occurred during the April 4th commission meeting. Also during the April 4th meeting, Ken Kaleel was appointed mayor and Geoff Pugh was appointed vice-mayor by the commission.

New Water Restrictions

New water restrictions went into effect March 26, 2011 for Palm Beach County. Below are the guidelines that effect our area:

Existing Landscaping

Odd-numbered street address residents and businesses may water lawns and landscapes on Wednesdays & Saturdays from 12am to 10am and/or from 4pm to 11:59pm.

Even-numbered street addresses, no street addresses or irrigate both even and odd address within the same zones, including multi-family units and homeowners associations, may water lawns and landscapes on Thursdays and Sundays from 12am to 10am and/or from 4pm to 11:59pm.



Was it a Panther, Bobcat, Jaguar, Cougar, or just a large house cat?

On Tuesday, 03/29/11 at 9:50 AM officers responded to the north side of Ocean Ave. at the Intracoastal Bridge to investigate the report of a “black Panther” sighting. Dog Tag issuance tops 1000

The Ocean Ridge Police Department Pet File was started in 1997 by Officer Wavell Darville and Dispatcher Jeanne Zuidema. Ocean Ridge resident Richard Lucibella paid for the first supply of the metal tags.

On Tuesday, March 29th, Tag #1000 was issued to Jacqui Westgate's Papillon dog "Reynar" of Briny Breezes.

The actual number of pets that have been reunited with their owners as a result of this program is not known. However, to simply call it a success is a gross understatement.

Congratulations to Ofc. Darville and Dispatcher Zuidema for such a great idea and to Mr. Lucibella for his start-up funding of the program. This is a great example of the spirit of "Community Policing".



Automated External Defibrillator installed at Town Hall/Police Com-

As a result of our grant application under a Federal program, ORPD was successful in receiving \$1,000 toward the purchase of a new AED. With the balance of the funds being provided by the Department of Public Safety Support Group, Inc., the device has been installed in the lobby.

This potential life-saving equipment will now be available for immediate use should someone suffer sudden cardiac arrest while attending a function within the Town Hall/Police Complex. All ORPD patrol vehicles are equipped with similar devices; however, due to age, we are working on funding sources to replace these units as they are no longer serviceable.

April Law Enforcement Events

"Tour-de-Force" bicycle ride: This annual fundraising event is in support of the families of Florida law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. The ride begins on Monday, April 11th in North Miami Beach and ends on Friday, April 15th in Daytona. The riders will enter Palm Beach County Monday afternoon and stop overnight in Boynton Beach. On Tuesday, Officer "Doc" Darville and Chief Christopher Yannuzzi will join the bikers as they travel from Boynton Beach to the Martin County Sheriff's Office; a distance of 54 miles. Federal Hwy and A1A will be utilized throughout the ride.

Chief Yannuzzi will be participating in support of the Special Olympics. He will also use this as a training run for the Boston Marathon, which he will be participating in on Monday, April 18th.

Scam Alert

Several months ago I warned of a scam involving victims receiving phone calls from persons claiming to be nieces, nephews, grandchildren (or people calling on their behalf) fraudulently claiming that they were arrested, are stranded or injured, need money, etc. The latest update to this scheme is that the criminals have employed a device that will correctly show the relatives name on the Caller ID.

In addition to notifying local law enforcement, Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi has requested that anyone who has received a suspicious call is asked to report it by calling 1-866-966-7226 or file a complaint at: <http://www.myfloridalegal.com>.

Put your keys beside your bed at night

Tell your spouse, your children, your neighbors, your parents, your Dr.'s office, the check-out girl at the market, and everyone you run across. Put your car keys beside your bed at night.

If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car key fob. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies. This tip came from a neighborhood crime watch coordinator.

Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this: It's a security alarm system that you probably already have that requires no installation. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and the horn will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key fob. It works if you park in your driveway or garage. If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break into your house, odds are the criminal won't stick around. After a few seconds all the neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there and sure enough the criminal won't want that.

Also, remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there. This is something that should really be shared with everyone. Maybe it could save a life or deter a crime.

P.S. This would also be useful for any emergency, such as a heart attack, where you can't reach a phone. Consider carrying your car keys with you in case you fall outside. You can activate the car alarm and then someone will know there's a problem.

Garden Club Town Hall Island Beautification Project

Several months ago, Julia Walker, the Chairperson of the Beautification Committee of the Ocean Ridge Garden Club, presented the idea of turning the island in front of the Town Hall into a demonstration native garden to the Town Commission who unanimously endorsed the idea. On Thursday, March 31st, phase one was implemented and almost completed.

The big machines came along with hundreds of plants and 5 strong and diligent employees of Delray Garden Center to ensure the process went without a hitch. The oleanders were removed as well as the overgrown dune daisies and the salt battered red cedar. Many of the dune daisies were recycled by Stella Kolb who will oversee the transplant process onto the dunes of Ocean Ridge near the Beachway walkover.

With the old under-performing and non-native plants removed, the center piece of the garden was placed. Two matching, curved sabal palms were placed where the red cedar once stood. The sabal palm is the state tree and is wind and salt tolerant. The oleanders were replaced with koonties while 200 new dune daisies were placed where the older ones had been removed. The sabal palms were underplanted with 7 thatch palms and 18 dwarf schilling hollies finished the planting.

Regarding hardscape, the grass on either side of the walk joining the public sidewalk to the gazebo-like structure in the middle of the island was dug out. Metal edging was placed followed by ground cloth and these two areas were then filled with crushed shells. On Wednesday, April 6th, two four foot benches will be delivered and placed atop these shells. These benches are not from the generosity of the Garden Club, but were donated by two generous private citizens.

That will complete stage one. Stage two will begin next year when the Garden Club “tweaks” what they have wrought and signs identifying the plants and their growing characteristics are placed.

Key Points from the 2010 Sea Turtle Season

Below are some key points from the 2010 sea turtle season:

1. 2010 was a blockbuster record high year - 19,521 total nests, 20% higher than the previous record high in 2000.
2. Compared to other counties, Palm Beach County has the 2nd highest number of loggerhead and green sea turtle nests after Brevard, and was virtually tied for first with Martin County for leatherback nests. Palm Beach County has 22% of the nesting of all species in Florida.
3. Ocean Ridge recorded 381 Loggerhead nests, 20 Green nests, and 5 Leatherback nests. (See chart on page 7 for more information)
4. Unfortunately, disorientation events also set a record high—436, nearly 50% higher than the previous record in 2007.







