Hurricane Season Preparation

As we approach another Hurricane Season (June 1 – November 30), Officers of the Ocean Ridge Police Department will conduct the annual property inspection process to identify hazardous conditions. Specifically, their focus will be on trees and other vegetation that may impact power and/or utility service lines and poles. Should a problem be identified, you will be notified and given time to correct the problem. Uncorrected issues will be addressed via a formal Notice of Violation and a Code Enforcement Hearing date will be set.

As always, our goal is Code “Compliance” rather than “Enforcement”. Please assist us in making Ocean Ridge a safer community and one that can more easily recover from a storm.

Proclamation for National Police Week
May 13 – 19, 2012 and
Peace Officers Memorial Day
May 15, 2012

WHEREAS, the Congress and President of the United States have designated May 15 as Peace Officers' Memorial Day, and the week in which May 15th falls as National Police Week; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Ocean Ridge Police Department play an essential role in safeguarding the rights and freedoms of the citizens in Ocean Ridge; and

WHEREAS, it is important that all citizens know and understand the duties, responsibilities, hazards, and sacrifices of their law enforcement agency, and that members of the Ocean Ridge Police Department recognize their duty to serve the people by safeguarding life and property, protecting them against violence and disorder, and by shielding the innocent from deception and the weak from oppression; and


WHEREAS, the men and women of the Ocean Ridge Police Department unceasingly provide a vital public service;

NOW, therefore, I, Geoffrey Pugh, Mayor of the Town Of Ocean Ridge, call upon all citizens and all patriotic, civic and educational organizations to observe the week of May 13 – 19, 2012 as National Police Week with appropriate ceremonies and observances in which all of our people may join in commemorating law enforcement officers, past and present. Who, by their faithful and loyal devotion to their responsibilities, have rendered a dedicated service to their communities and, in so doing, have established for themselves an enviable and enduring reputation for preserving the rights and security of all citizens.

WHEREAS, according to the U.S. Department of Justice, in one year there were an estimated nearly 800,000 children missing; and

WHEREAS, on average, there is an estimated average of 2,200 children reported missing to law-enforcement agencies daily; and


WHEREAS, 58,200 of these children are victims of non-family abductions and more than 200,000 are the victims of family abductions; and

WHEREAS, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children® exists as a resource to help prevent child abduction and sexual exploitation; help find missing children; and assist victims of child abduction and sexual exploitation, their families, and the professionals who serve them, and;

WHEREAS, this special day is a time to remember those children who are missing and to give hope to their families;

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that, in partnership with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children® and its collaborative organizations, the Town of Ocean Ridge proclaims Friday, May 25th, 2012 as "National Missing Children's Day", and encourages all individuals to "Take 25" minutes to help children stay safer.

AT HOME

- Teach children their full names, address, and home telephone number. Make sure they know your full name.
- Make sure children know how to reach you at work or on your cell phone.
- Teach children how and when to use 911, and make sure they have a trusted adult to call if they're scared or have an emergency.
- Instruct children to keep the doors locked and not to open doors to talk to anyone when they are home alone.
- Choose babysitters with care. Once you have chosen the caregiver, drop in unexpectedly to see how your children are doing. Ask children about their experience and listen carefully to their responses.

GOING TO AND FROM SCHOOL

- Walk or drive the route to and from school with children, pointing out landmarks and safe places to go if they're being followed or need help.
- Remind children to take a friend whenever they walk or bike to school and to stay with a group at the bus stop.
- Caution children never to accept a ride from anyone unless you have told them it is okay to do so in each instance.

OUT AND ABOUT

- Take children on a walking tour of the neighborhood, and tell them whose homes they may visit without you.
- Teach children to ask permission before leaving home.
- Remind children not to walk or play alone outside.
- Remind children it's okay to say no to anything that makes them feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused. Teach children to tell you if anything or anyone makes them feel this way.
- Teach children to never approach a vehicle, occupied or not, unless they are accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other trusted adult.
- Practice "what-if" situations and ask children how they would respond. "What if you fell off your bike and you needed help? Who would you ask?"
- Teach children to check in with you if there is a change of plans.
- During family outings, establish a central, easy-to-locate spot to meet should you get separated.
- Teach children how to locate help in public places. Identify people who they can ask for help, such as uniformed law enforcement, security guards, and store clerks with nametags.
- Help children learn to recognize and avoid potential risks, so that they can deal with them if they happen.
- Teach children that if anyone tries to grab them, they should make a scene and make every effort to get away by kicking, screaming, and resisting.

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ON THE NET

Learn about the Internet. Visit www.NetSmartz.org for more information about Internet safety.

Place the family computer in a common area, rather than a child's bedroom. Monitor their time spent online and the websites they've visited, and establish rules for Internet use.

Know what other access children have to the Internet at school, libraries, or friends' homes.

Use privacy settings on social networking sites to limit contact with unknown users, and make sure screennames don't reveal too much about children.

- Encourage children to tell you if anything they encounter online makes them feel sad, scared, or confused.
- Caution children not to post revealing information or inappropriate photos of themselves or their friends online.

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KNOW THE RULES...

Safety Tips for Children Displaced in Natural Disasters and Their Caregivers

Many children caught up in a natural disaster have not only been separated from their families but find themselves in a new state, school, and living environment. Often they must receive help and care from people they do not know. The trauma they experience may not be readily discernible. The tips noted below are designed to help child victims of natural disasters acclimate to a new environment and caregivers provide the best assistance possible.

Tips for Children

- **CHECK FIRST** with the adult in charge before going anywhere or leaving with anyone.
- Stay together and go places with a friend or sibling.
- If anyone tries to touch you or does anything to make you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused, say **NO**.
- Tell the adult in charge if anything happens to make you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused.
- **Ask for help from the adult in charge if anything happens to make you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused.**

Tips for Caregivers

- Make sure you know where the children in your care are at all times, and make certain to provide close supervision at all times either yourself or by trusted adults.
- Help children acclimate to new environments by taking time to show them around and explain any rules or guidelines to children who are old enough to understand.
- Give children time to acclimate, and be patient with those who appear to be withdrawn, shy, or angry. When talking to the children in your care, do so in a calm, nonthreatening, and reassuring manner. Get the support you need from other adults so you may be in the best shape to help those in your care. Reach out for helpful resources.
- Since the environment is new for the children in your care, ask how you may make the stay more comfortable. Offer to do things such as leaving a light on at night or reading at bedtime. Establish a routine with the children that includes scheduled nutritious meals and bedtimes.
- Be sensitive to individual needs and seek professional help for any children in your care who demonstrate acting out behaviors, appear to be extremely withdrawn, or have difficulties adjusting to the new environment.
- Make every effort to normalize the situation by enrolling the school-aged children in your care in school, providing activities for school-aged children outside of school, and providing structured activities for children who are too young to attend school. Try to introduce the children in your care to other children their age.
- Be as involved as possible in activities in which the children in your care participate so you may better observe the adults in charge and how they interact with program participants.
- The children in your care may have concerns, fears, and questions about why this happened and what will happen next. Encourage open communication, listen compassionately, and take every opportunity to reassure.

Tips for Dealing With Others' Curiosity and Media Requests

- People will be naturally curious about the children in your care. Ask the children how they feel about being around others and if they want to participate in a specific activity or go to a certain place.
- Children should be shielded from media contact, and any requests for interviews should be routed through the Department of Social Services or adult in charge of the facility, shelter, or placement in the state in which the child is residing.



Energy Rebate Program Saves Energy, Money

Open to Residents, Businesses, HOAs, and Condo Associations

It's shocking that people are still paying more for their monthly electric bill than they should. Especially when there's energy rebates available for up to \$2,100 through the Municipal Energy Conservation Coalition's (MECC) Energy Conservation Rebate Program. The Program, called Energy2Save, is designed to raise awareness and help motivate the community to take action on energy conservation practices that reduce greenhouse gases and energy use.

Eligible residents, businesses, HOAs and condo associations located within the towns of Haverhill and Ocean Ridge, and the City of Atlantis may apply for multiple rebates.

Rebates, and the associated rebate amounts, will be provided for the replacement and installation of the following items:

Programmable Thermostat	Up to \$30
Central Air Conditioning System*	\$2,100
Air Conditioning Ducts	Up to \$154
Ceiling Insulation	Up to \$300
Solar Water Heater	Up to \$1,000
Reflective Roof Coating**	Up to \$325

* Minimum SEER rating of 14 is required.

** Not available in the City of Atlantis.

Applying is Easy

1. Log onto Energy2Save.net to find out if you qualify under the Program's Terms and Conditions.
2. If you do, and funding is still available, complete and submit an application.
3. After your application is approved, you can purchase and install your energy efficient products.
4. After installation, you must submit the required documentation within the appropriate timeframe and your rebate will be mailed to you. It's that easy!

Other restrictions apply, but the minimum requirements include:

- Open to residents own their single-family home, townhouse, or condo; business owners; HOAs, and condo association who reside within the program area where the energy efficient products will be installed.
- Must be a Florida Power and Light (FPL) account holder at the location where the rebated items are being installed.
- Application must be **completed, submitted and approved** before the applicant may purchase the energy efficient products for which they wish to seek a rebate.
- Applicant is solely responsible for the purchase and installation of rebate-eligible products and all related parts, permits, equipment, and adherence to all building codes, deed restrictions, homeowner's association organization restrictions, and other applicable ordinances, codes and restrictions.
- Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis, and are subject to the availability of funds, or until the program is terminated.

And, there is even more great news. Qualifying participants that are approved through the Florida Power & Light Rebate Program may be eligible to receive additional rebate money. However, the combined rebate amounts may not exceed the total cost paid for the products.
