## Recipe: Watermelon Arugula Salad w/Citrus Vinaigrette

### Ingredients:

5oz Arugula  
2cups diced watermelon  
1/4cup diced green onions  
1/2cup feta cheese, crumbled

### Dressing:

Zest orange for 1 tspn  
Juice of one orange  
2 tbsp lime juice  
1/2tsp fresh minced ginger  
1 large garlic clove, minced  
1/2cup extra virgin olive oil  
1/2tsp kosher salt  
1/4tsp freshly ground pepper

### Directions:

1. In a large serving bowl, place arugula, watermelon, onions and toss to distribute.
2. Place zest, orange juice, lime juice, ginger and garlic in a small mixing bowl. Add olive oil and whisk to combine. Season to taste with Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper.

Distribute salad ingredients evenly among four plates, drizzle dressing and crumble feta cheese on top, and serve.

## UPDATE: Free Document Shredding held April 19, 2013

Several residents of Ocean Ridge and Briny Breezes took advantage of the free document shredding that was offered on Friday, April 19 between 9:00AM - 12:00PM. In all, approximately 1,000 lbs of documents were destroyed.

### KEEPING YOUR IDENTITY PRIVATE IN PUBLIC RECORDS

Identity theft is the fifth-largest crime in the United States. In Palm Beach County alone, more than 35,000 people had their identities stolen last year. And government records are the go-to place for I.D. thieves to hunt for your personal information.

That's why the Clerk & Comptroller's office is committed to ensuring that your private information doesn't become public. We use state-of-the-art technology to remove private information, such as Social Security and bank account numbers, from more than 5 million documents each year.

But making sure public records are scrubbed of private data is only one step to guarding against identity theft.

The clerk's office recommends that you to be proactive about protecting your privacy in our public records.

Our online court records and official records searches are two excellent ways to see what information is publicly available about you. Official records such as mortgages, deeds and marriage licenses can be viewed for free online,

or you can visit any of our courthouse locations to review documents.

The clerk's office public records privacy page at [MyPalmBeachClerk.com](http://MyPalmBeachClerk.com), details the type of information that must be redacted from court and official records. If you find information such as your Social Security or credit card numbers on any documents, you should submit a request to have that information removed. You can find those request forms on the website.

Finally, the identity theft resources page, also found on the website, is an excellent resource that includes tips for preventing identity theft, who to contact if you're a victim and other useful information.




WHEREAS, the men and women of the Ocean Ridge Police Department unceasingly provide a vital public service;




WHEREAS, this special day is a time to remember those children who are missing and to give hope to their families;

## 25 WAYS TO MAKE KIDS SAFER

### AT HOME



- Teach children their full name, address, and home telephone number. Make sure they know your full name.
- Make sure children know how to reach you at work or on your cell phone.
- Teach children how and when to use 911, and make sure they have a trusted adult to call if they're scared or have an emergency.
- Instruct children to keep the doors locked and not to open doors to talk to anyone when they are home alone.
- Choose babysitters with care. Once you have chosen the caregiver, drop in unexpectedly to see how your children are doing. Ask children about their experience and listen carefully to their responses.

### GOING TO AND FROM SCHOOL



- Walk or drive the route to and from school with children, pointing out landmarks and safe places to go if they're being followed or need help.
- Remind children to take a friend whenever they walk or bike to school and to stay with a group at the bus stop.
- Caution children never to accept a ride from anyone unless you have told them it is okay to do so in each instance.

### OUT AND ABOUT



- Take children on a walking tour of the neighborhood, and tell them whose homes they may visit without you.
- Teach children to ask permission before leaving home.
- Remind children not to walk or play alone outside.
- Remind children it's okay to say no to anything that makes them feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused. Teach children to tell you if anything or anyone makes them feel this way.
- Teach children to never approach a vehicle, occupied or not, unless they are accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other trusted adult.
- Practice "what-if" situations and ask children how they would respond. "What if you fell off your bike and you needed help? Who would you ask?"
- Teach children to check in with you if there is a change of plans.
- During family outings, establish a central, easy-to-locate spot to meet should you get separated.
- Teach children how to locate help in public places. Identify people who they can ask for help, such as uniformed law enforcement, security guards, and store clerks with nametags.
- Help children learn to recognize and avoid potential risks, so that they can deal with them if they happen.
- Teach children that if anyone tries to grab them, they should make a scene and make every effort to get away by kicking, screaming, and resisting.

### ON THE NET



- Learn about the Internet. Visit [www.NetSmartz.org](http://www.NetSmartz.org) for more information about Internet safety.
- Place the family computer in a common area, rather than a child's bedroom. Monitor their time spent online and the websites they've visited, and establish rules for Internet use.
- Know what other access children have to the Internet at school, libraries, or friends' homes.
- Use privacy settings on social networking sites to limit contact with unknown users, and make sure screennames don't reveal too much about children.
- Encourage children to tell you if anything they encounter online makes them feel sad, scared, or confused.
- Caution children not to post revealing information or inappropriate photos of themselves or their friends online.

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## It's that time again! – Hurricane Season Preparation:

Police Department personnel have begun the annual survey of the Town for potential threatening conditions related to trees and vegetation in the utility lines (FPL, AT&T, and Comcast). Should an issue be identified, the below letter will be given to the property owner. As indicated, we seek compliance within 14 days. This will help ensure the safety of everyone involved and reduce the negative impact caused by the loss of these utilities.

Please keep in mind that during "Super Storm" Sandy, only 2 small areas of Town lost power; however, both were caused by tree limbs taking down utility lines.

Dear Resident:

June 1<sup>st</sup> marks the start of another Hurricane Season! Past severe storms caused tremendous damage in Ocean Ridge; which resulted in the Town Commission taking action to protect our utility lines and poles from similar damage in the future. In addition, FPL, AT&T and Comcast have worked hard to strengthen the entire utility system in our area.


The enacted Ordinance (66-151 (b) (7)) speaks to the required trimming of vegetation and trees located near or under, "...power or other utility lines or facilities..." that are suspended above the ground. Members of your Police Department have begun to conduct a thorough inspection to identify vegetation & trees on your property that are in a position or condition to constitute a threat to our power and utility system.

Therefore, a "Warning Notice" has been issued to advise you of your responsibility to maintain the problem vegetation & trees and directing you to take the appropriate steps to have the items trimmed or removed (keeping in mind, some tree removal may require a permit). We request that threat abatement measures be taken within 14 days of the notice. In addition, this threat reduction must be sustained throughout the entire storm season (June 1<sup>st</sup> thru November 30<sup>th</sup>)

As always, it is our desire to obtain voluntary compliance so as to make the Town safer for all first responders and the citizens we serve. Such corrective action will reduce the recovery time that would follow any storm that impacts our area. However, should it be necessary, follow up enforcement action will be taken by the Police Department.

We are counting on your cooperation because all residents of the Town share the power and utility system and everyone depends upon it for our mutual health, safety, and well being.

## May's Regular Town Commission Meeting Action Summary

The following are actions taken at the May 2013 meeting:

1. Approved the Regular Town Commission Meeting minutes of April 1, 2013.
2. Announced Proclamations for "National Missing Children's Day on May 25<sup>th</sup>", Week of May 12<sup>th</sup> as "National Police Week" and May 15<sup>th</sup> as "Peace Officers Memorial Day", "National Public Works Week" and "Water Reuse Week" starting May 19<sup>th</sup>", and May as "Civility Month".
3. Approved a Land Development Permit for the relocation of pool and driveway that will be extend east of the Coastal Construction Control Line and also approved a Right-of-Way Obstruction Agreement for the relocation of landscaping and additional landscaping in the Town's ROW on Old Ocean Blvd. Both are located at 5000 Old Ocean Blvd.
4. Directed Town Attorney to draft the rental ordinance so as to require single family homeowners to register the property as a rental property through the completion of an appropriate form with an escalating fine mechanism for violators.
5. Approved the Annual Audit for FY 2011/12 presented by Nowlen, Holt & Miner, PA.
6. Approved the placement of a Sales/Construction Trailer at the Ocean Breeze, LLC site (3 Adams Road) for a six month period.
7. Confirmed the hiring of new Dispatcher/Clerk, Krystine Ramos.
8. Appointed Terry Brown to serve as an alternate member to the P & Z Commission.
9. Adopted Ordinance No. 602; Amending Chapter 66 Article IV, Landscaping, Creating a New Division 5 –Florida-Friendly Use of Fertilizer on second reading.
10. Approved Ordinance 603; Amending Chapter 30, Licenses and Business Regulations, by Creating a New Article VII, Business Permit Section 30-157, Residential Rental Registration and Section 30-158, Fee.
11. Directed the Town Manager to research the options, cost, and legal vs zoning ramifications for a commercial zoning district in the south end of Town.
12. Discussed a possible amendment to the code pertaining to screening of boats/trailers/motorhomes from 3 sides to 4 sides and also limiting the permitted height of a boat/trailer/motorhome not to exceed 6' in height – consensus was not to amend the code.
13. Approved the Agreement Between the Town and PBCty Benevolent Assoc., Inc. (PBA) to Formally Establish the Wages, Hours and Terms and Conditions of Employment for Bargaining Unit Members covering the period of Oct. 1, 2012 – Sept. 30, 2014.
14. Directed staff to research the multi-family condominium/cooperative documents regarding unit rental regulations/registrations.

# Ocean Ridge Koi Garden Fund

I am sure that by now most residents of Ocean Ridge have visited the new Town Hall and Police Department and observed the Koi pond and garden. If you have, I am equally convinced that you feel it adds a special ambience to the entryway of the new town buildings.

What you may not know is that the maintenance funds for the Koi garden come out of the town's general budget account. With the shortage in our town budget, this does not leave a lot to maintain the pond and garden when something arises. That is why it was drained in December and kept empty for four months before funds were available to repair leaks and get the pond up and running.



Several residents and I feel the garden and Koi pond adds uniqueness to our town and the new town hall. We have started a fund — The Ocean Ridge Koi Garden Fund—to keep the garden and pond at its finest. With this fund we will be able to help the town maintain the garden should problems arise that need repair. 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# OP ART ON DISPLAY TO OPEN ON MAY 13 CONNECTS WITH KINETIC ART IN BOYNTON

**BOYNTON BEACH, FL** --- A new Art in Public Places “Op Art” exhibit will open May 13 in the City’s Library, featuring Stanford Slutsky’s Kinetic and Optical artwork. Kinetic Art refers to art that moves, or that gives the sensation of movement, through its optical effects. As viewers enjoy and move around the art, the art work’s light, colors and surfaces change dramatically. Optical art is a method of painting that provides an interaction between illusion and picture plane, between understanding and seeing. Op art works are abstract. When viewed, the impression of movement, hidden images, flashing, vibration, patterns, or alternatively, of swelling or warping.

Slutsky’s optical art is composed of precisely cut wooden geometric shapes all fitting together to give the illusion of depth and distance. Slutsky works are meticulously created by cutting wood with table saws and jig-saws, separating them into pieces with spacers and fitting them perfectly with their counterparts on a canvas or in a frame.

Slutsky uses magnets to piece together many of his works, making these removable, though not noticeable at first, they become an interesting surprise to the viewer. He also created painted acrylics pieces on wrapped canvas that have become popular among collectors.



Inspired by Victor Vassarely, Slutsky achieves his effects by juxtaposing hard-edged color patterns that disrupt the normal process of vision. Some shapes of color seem to advance and then recede; others appear to pulsate in waves. Slutsky painstaking, semi-scientific approach to painting and mixed media constructions are based on the manipulation of optical devices and depend on subtle color gradations, systematic chromatic harmonic lines and shapes.

All pieces created by Slutsky are one-of-a-kind and for sale with commissions benefitting the Art in Public Places program and Friends of the Library. The Stanford Slutsky “Op Art” exhibit begins May 13 and continues through December 5. Art in Public Places and the City Library will host a meet the artist reception Saturday, June 8, 2- 4 pm. Public is welcome and encouraged to attend. The City Library is located at 208 South Seacrest Boulevard, Boynton Beach.




