Ocean Ridge Resident is Off to London for the 2012 Paralympic Games

Since birth, 24-year-old Noah Yablong faced extreme physical challenges, yet that never stopped him from team sports. As part of the United States Tennis Association (USTA) and U.S. National Wheelchair Tennis Team (USNWTT), Yablong will represent the USA at the 2012 Paralympics in London, Sept. 1 – 9.

Diagnosed at 10, with Legg Calve Perthes disease, a painful degenerative bone condition, Yablong pursued his love of sports in a wheelchair. During high school in Indiana, he competed as a Junior in the World Team Cup twice, in the Netherlands and Brazil, and once at the Junior World Invitational in Tarbes, France.

He recently graduated with an engineering management degree and mechanical engineering from the University of Arizona, where he played on its tennis team. In April 2011 at the Florida Open International Wheelchair Tennis Championships held annually in Boca Raton, Noah says, "I won the second draw division of the men's Open. That was a big deal for me. It was the light bulb moment when I thought, 'maybe I am really good enough to do this'." (continued on page 9)



FATHER OF COMMUNITY POLICING DIES



The social scientist, James Q. Wilson, better known to crime prevention practitioners as the "father of community policing," and co-inventor of the "broken windows" theory died March 2nd at the age of 80. Wilson and George L. Kelling's theory changed

the role of the modern police officer while greatly impacted crime prevention. As Wilson told the New York Times in 1998, "The standard question was why did people commit crimes. I wanted to ask why people don't commit them

Wilson changed the face of American policing in 1982 when he and colleague George L. Kelling wrote an article for the Atlantic titled "Broken Windows: The Police and Neighborhood Safety."

As crime rates soared across the country, the two academics made a provocative argument about the role of police: Instead of defining themselves mainly as crime fighters, Kelling and Wilson wrote, the police should become keepers of public order. Instead of focusing principally on the big crimes, such as robbery and murder, the authors said, they should pay more attention to the smaller problems that were eroding the quality of life in people's communities and weakening their defenses to major crime.

Or, as Wilson and Kelling explained in deceptively simple terms: "One unrepaired broken window is a signal that no one cares, and so breaking more windows costs nothing."

Dr. Wilson's philosophy and research are representative of the type of community-oriented law enforcement provided by the members of the Ocean Ridge Police Department. We focus on the quality of life issues (Town Code violations such as property maintenance, business registration, and permits; traffic enforcement; alarm response; visibility,; etc.) to reduce the possibility of escalating criminal activity. Taking care of the little problems before they become big ones.

Study: Few Aware of Risk of Medical ID Theft


While it's the fastest-growing type of identity theft, a new Nationwide Insurance survey reveals few people know what medical identity theft is or how devastating it can be to your credit and your health.

The national telephone survey commissioned by Nationwide Insurance was conducted by Harris Interactive in February among 2,001 adults with health insurance. It found only 1 in 6 (15%) of insured adults say they are familiar with medical identity theft. Of that 15% only one in three (38 percent) could correctly define "medical identity."

"A stolen medical identity has a \$50 street value -- whereas a stolen social security number, on the other hand, only sells for \$1*," said Kirk Herath, Nationwide Chief Privacy Officer. "However, while most people are very careful with their social security number to protect their credit and personal information, they tend to be less careful when it comes to their medical information."

What is "Medical Identify Theft?"

Medical ID theft occurs when one person steals another's medical information to obtain or pay for



health care treatment. It's a crime that can have a serious impact on your personal, financial and medical well being.

According to the World Privacy Foundation, medical identity theft has affected 1.5 million Americans at a cost

of more than \$30 billion.

If someone steals your medical information they illegally can use your health care insurance to obtain medical care, buy prescription drugs or submit false insurance claims in your name, all of which can lead to devastating financial results or potentially hazardous changes to your medical records.

The three most common ways your medical identity could be compromised are:

- Financial medical identity theft -- Someone is getting medical help using your name and/or other information.
- -- Criminal medical identity theft -- You are being held responsible for the actions of another's criminal behavior.
- -- Government benefit fraud -- Your medical benefits are being used by another person.

Devastating Consequences, Difficult Recovery

According to the Nationwide survey, more than half (56%) of insured adults said it's likely that their credit card or credit card number would be stolen, while only one-third (32%) say they expect their medical identification to be stolen.

About one in five (22%) believe the most likely consequence would be that their health insurance could be cancelled, when in reality hazardous changes could be made to their medical records compromising their health.

"These are warning signs that should not be ignored," Herath said. "The cost and time associated with cleaning up a medical account is sizeable."

The personal expense of resolving a medical identity theft is about \$20,000, according to actual victims. The same victims also said they had spent four to six months resolving the theft**.

More than half of the study participants underestimated how long it would take to restore their medical identity. Nineteen percent or about 1 in 5 said it would take less than two weeks. And more than half underestimated or didn't know how much it would cost.

When it comes to taking proactive measures to review their medical records for errors, 75 percent or 3 of 4 study participants "trust" that their medical records are correct.

"Blind faith in a medical record is risky behavior," Herath said. "Nationwide Insurance recommends being as knowledgeable about your medical records as you are about your financial reports."

- Closely monitor any "Explanation of Benefits" sent by health insurers
- Pro-actively request a listing of benefits from your health insurers
- Request a copy of current medical files from each health care provider
- If you are victim, file a police report
- Correct erroneous and false information in your file
- Keep an eye on your credit repor
- Request an accounting of disclosures

School's Open!

KNOW THE RULES... For Going To and From School More Safely



Every day millions of children take to the streets and highways to get to and from school. For many children this experience is a new one, and they may not understand or be able to use the safety rules. Young children do not have the same frame of reference for safety as adults do. They may not "look before they leap," which is why it is so important for families to supervise young children and practice safety skills with their older children to make certain they really know and understand them. In an analysis of attempted nonfamily abductions the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) found approximately 36% of attempted abductions happened when a child was going to or from school or a school-related activity.² The tips noted below will help prepare for a safer journey.

Tips for Parents or Guardians

1. Instruct your children to always **TAKE A FRIEND**, always stay in well-lit areas, never take shortcuts, and never go into isolated areas. Teach them to stay aware of their surroundings and observe all traffic rules in place to more safely share the roads and sidewalks with others.
2. Walk the route to and from school with your children pointing out landmarks and safe places to go if they're being followed or need help. Make the walk to and from school a "teachable moment" and chance to put their skills to the test. Make a map with your children showing acceptable routes to and from school. If your children wait for a bus, wait with them or make arrangements for supervision at the bus stop.
3. If anyone bothers your children or makes them feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused, while going to or from school, teach your children to trust their feelings, immediately get away from that person, and **TELL** you or another trusted adult. If an adult approaches your children for help or directions, remember grownups needing help should not ask children; they should ask other adults. Instruct your children to never approach a vehicle or accept money or gifts from anyone unless you have told them it is **OK** to accept in each instance.
4. Even though there may be safety in numbers it is still not safe for young children to walk to and from school, especially if they must take isolated routes anytime during the day or in darkness. Always provide supervision for your young children to help ensure their safe arrival to and from school.
5. Instruct your children to leave items and clothing with their name on them at home. If anyone calls out their name, teach them to not be fooled or confused. Teach your children about the tricks someone may try to use to confuse them or engage them in conversation. Children should also be taught that they do not need to be polite if approached and to get out of the situation as quickly and safely as possible.
6. Ensure current and accurate emergency contact information is on file for your children at their school. If you, or another trusted family member or friend, need to pick up your children, make sure to follow the school's departure procedures. These procedures need to include the school's confirmation of your children's departure with only those you authorize to pick them up.

7. Teach your children if anyone tries to take them somewhere they should quickly get away and yell, "This person is trying to take me away" or "This person is not my father/mother/guardian." Teach your children to make a scene and every effort to get away by kicking, screaming, and resisting if anyone tries to grab them.
8. Teach your children if anyone follows them on foot to get away from that person as quickly as possible. If anyone follows them in a vehicle they should turn around, go in the other direction, and try to quickly get to a spot where a trusted adult may help them. Advise them to be sure to **TELL** you or another trusted adult what happened.
9. Instruct your children to never leave school with anyone until they've checked with a trusted adult. If anyone tells them there is an emergency and they want your children to go with them, teach your children to always **CHECK FIRST** with you before doing anything. Also teach your children to always **CHECK FIRST** with you if they want to change their plans before or after school. Make sure your children always play with other children, have your permission to play in specific areas, and let you know where they are going to be. Instruct your children to **TELL** a trusted adult if they notice anyone they don't know or feel comfortable with hanging around them.
10. In the event your children may be lost or injured, make sure they carry a contact card with your name and telephone numbers such as work and cellular. This card should be hidden from plain view.



Key Tips to Reinforce With Your Children

1. Always **TAKE A FRIEND** with you when walking, biking, or standing at the bus stop. Make sure you know your bus number and which bus to ride.
2. Say **NO** if anyone you don't know or a person who makes you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused offers a ride. Do **NOT** accept a ride from anyone unless I have told you it is **OK** to do so in each instance.
3. Quickly get away and yell, "**THIS PERSON IS NOT MY MOTHER/FATHER/GUARDIAN**" if anyone tries to take you somewhere or is following you. If anyone tries to grab you, make a scene and every effort to get away by kicking, screaming, and resisting.
4. **NEVER LEAVE SCHOOL GROUNDS** before the regular school day ends. Always check with the office and me before leaving school early.
5. **NEVER** take shortcuts or walk through alleys to get to or from school. We will talk about which way to go to and from school. Remind me if activities you participate in cause you to leave earlier or arrive home later than usual. Remember to call me once you have arrived home.

Noah played on the ATP circuit in Europe last summer returning home ranked 55 in the world, which he describes as, "Insane!" During winter break, Noah competed in Australia and by the end of December, he reached his career high ranking of 41.

That ranking qualified Noah to compete for the men's USA team at the 2012 BNP Paribas World Team Cup in Seoul, Korea. Due to a lack of tournament play during his final semester at college and the demands of graduating, Noah's ranking fell, eliminating the possibility of a direct entry qualification. The USTA put in for a wild card spot. In June, Noah got a call from USNWTTC Coach Dan James, telling Yablong he would play singles and doubles for the USA at the 2012 Paralympic Games in London. This was one of the most exciting moments for Noah. Noah will be playing both singles and doubles in the Games.

Paralympic Games begin August 27, the tennis event will begin on September 1, 2012 and run through September 9, 2012. You can follow Noah's participation in the 2012 Paralympic Games in London by following his Facebook page.—Article submitted by Nan Yablong


