License Plate Recognition Cameras

The Commission is holding off on the installation of the license plate cameras. The cameras would take a picture of license plates as they enter or leave Town for assistance in solving crimes. However, three of the entrances to the Town are on FDOT right-of-ways. FDOT has declined to allow any new installations of cameras on their property. Without these entrances included, the program would be incomplete. We're hoping FDOT will change their mind but we don't know if or when. When they do, the camera program should be revisited.

Demolition of Derelict Buildings

Several months ago the Commission adopted a program whereas the Town can demolish derelict buildings that are unsafe or are a health hazard to the community. The building at 110 Bonito Drive is such a building. The Town has gone through the legal procedures to demolish the building and recoup the costs through a tax lien on the property. We have selected a contractor and have authorized the demolition. The demolition should be completed within the next month. We will use this program throughout the community as necessary.

August's Regular Town Commission Meeting Action Summary

The following list is actions taken at the August 3, 2015 meeting:

1. Approved the Regular Town Commission Meeting Minutes for July 6, 2015 and Public Hearing/Budget Proposed Millage Meeting of July 21, 2015
2. Proclaimed August as "Florida Water Professionals Month"
3. Approved a Land Development Permit for 6161 North Ocean Blvd. (single family residence, 8 car garage, pool/deck and amenities) contingent on DEP approval and zoning and building permit approval
4. Approved Lien Release with partial reductions (\$18,902.22) for 6007 Ridge Lane to a revised total of \$10,000.00 plus \$30.00 record/release of lien
5. Cancelled the Original Amount of up to \$25,000 from the Contingency Account for the Demolition of 110 Bonito Drive and then Approved Resolution No. 2015-05; Amending the 2014/15 Budget to Include a Transfer from the Unassigned Fund Balance to the General Fund Operating Budget (for the purpose of funding the demolition of 110 Bonito Drive and placing a Special Assessment on the Property)
6. Authorized \$9,000 for Chamber/Community Room/Dispatch Carpet Replacement and \$16,300 for Repairs/Upgrades to the Sound System/Recording System from Mingace Custom Sound from the Contingency Account. Staff to also research possible audio of meetings
7. Scheduled a public hearing on Sept. 10, 2015 at 5:01 PM to adopt a non-ad valorem assessment roll after the Tentative Budget Adoption and prior to the Regular Meeting
8. Deferred the adoption of Resolution No. 2015-04; Amending the FY 14/15 Budget to transfer funds for the reimbursement of the Commissioner's legal fees to wait for a full Commission vote
9. Approved the Annual Floodplain Management Report for FY 2014/15
10. Authorized the Town Attorney to seek authorization from the Special Magistrate to foreclose on the lien on 87 Island Drive So.
11. Consensus for the Commission to submit a shortlist of 6 Town Manager applicants by Aug. 21, 2015 at which time the Town Clerk will provide a shortlist summary and schedule a special meeting to discuss the interview/format process
12. Consensus for the Police Chief to schedule a Police Oriented Q & A and Informative Workshop Meeting for all interested residents in the Fall
13. Consensus not to move forward on the License Plate Recognition Cameras (LPR's) at this time until such time that the Florida Legislature may reconsider use of placement or recording within the FDOT ROW's

Panhandling Banned on County Roads

At the June 23, 2015 board meeting, the County Commission approved a new ordinance prohibiting panhandling on county roads. The ban only covers panhandling on county streets and medians and does not include road shoulders or sidewalks.

Over the years, as panhandling has been increasing, so have complaints from residents countywide. A recent ban in Broward County caused a surge in panhandling in south county, creating the catalyst for the new ordinance.

The new ordinance addresses public safety for drivers, pedestrians, and panhandlers. The ban pertains to

anyone standing in the street or median soliciting for business and charitable contributions, distributing materials or goods, and displaying information.

The ordinance, however, does not prohibit anyone from exercising the right to protest, which can still take place on the side of the road.

Additionally, the county worked closely with firefighters concerning their annual fundraiser (boot drive) that has been held on medians. Consequently, an arrangement has been made with Publix to hold future collections at area stores.

The panhandling ban will only cover the parts of the county not in municipalities, although individual cities will have the option to adopt it.

Community Cats & Dogs in Public Places

Some significant changes were made to the Animal Care & Control ordinance pertaining to community (stray) cats and dogs in public places:

- Dogs are required to be leashed when not on an owner's or caregiver's property. Exceptions include law enforcement dogs and dogs at public beaches and dog parks.
- All community cats must be sterilized, microchipped, vaccinated for rabies and ear-tipped for identification.
- Community cats maintained on private property must have a property owner's or manager's permission.

Project CatSnip is a spay neuter program for free-roaming community cats in Palm Beach County using the Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return method to control their population in a humane and effective manner.

Free-roaming community cats will be spayed/neutered, vaccinated against rabies and distemper, microchipped, and their left ear will be tipped for visual confirmation that the cats have been "fixed". TNVR surgeries are performed Monday through Friday—no appointment necessary. Cats must be in traps like the one shown here. One cat per trap please.

August's Crime Prevention Information From Investigator Richard Jones

Close the Door to Crime

In recent months, an old crime trend has sparked a new beginning. Criminals posing as utility workers will simply knock on your door and give you one excuse after another about your utility services and the need for them to enter your home. Once inside your home, you become the victim of theft, assault and even more serious crimes. The majority of these criminals may wear work related clothing, so at first sight you may think that everything is legitimate even though it is not.

Some of the previous cases involve one criminal requesting that you exit the home to point out an issue or show you something relating to your utilities. Once you exit your home, another criminal you do not even know is present will enter your home and begin taking your hard earned property. Many times, you are unaware of this until hours or days later.

Although we cannot prevent someone from knocking on our door, we do have the ability to choose the outcome. I don't have all the answers for every scenario, but I will give you several thoughts to consider.

What about requiring identification prior to opening the door? Or looking out a window for a clearly marked and familiar vehicle before opening the door? You can even ask the person "What number can I call to verify your identity?" as most criminals will not know the local utility company number by memory. Common sense should also be employed. If your power is out and you see several FPL trucks in the neighborhood, it may be likely that someone from FPL may need to enter your property. On the other hand, if someone shows up stating that they are from Comcast and you have not requested their appearance, you should become alert and aware and contact the Police.

Take a moment to verify the person's true identity before giving them access to your property, home and all your personal belongings. If this seems like too much of an inconvenience to the person knocking, they are probably true criminals with bad intentions. As always, feel free to call the Police Department and request an officer regarding an unknown visitor. We will gladly respond and identify the visitor's true identity.

If your home is armed with an alarm that has a panic feature, use it. We will respond promptly. Your safety is our business and is our main concern.

As discussed in previous crime prevention tips, opportunity is what a criminal thrives on. If we take away the opportunity, they will be powerless.

Please Make Sure Your Children Ride Safe

Child bicycle safety is a priority for us. We believe that children who are taught proper bicycle safety and riding skills carry those lessons for life. Ultimately **their safety** is our main concern. Because of this, two members of your Police Department have chosen to attend a bicycle helmet certification training course. This course allows these Officers to properly fit helmets for children and adults. In addition, as a result of their participation, the Department has received a limited number of bicycle helmets to give out to residents of the Town.

As head injuries are often the most serious injury in a bicycle crash, we would like all who ride to be protected. If you or your child are in need of having a helmet fitted, or are in need of a helmet and would like to receive a free bicycle helmet, please contact Sergeant "Rick" Stang or Investigator Richard Jones to make the necessary arrangements. They may be reached at (561) 732-8331. (Helmets supplied are limited and will be available only as long as the supply lasts.)

Under Florida Laws, all persons under the age of sixteen must wear a certified bicycle helmet when operating a bicycle. (FSS 316.2065)



National Drug Takeback Initiative

On September 26, 2015 many law enforcement agencies throughout the country will be assisting the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration in an annual unwanted prescription drug take back initiative. This program is designed to keep unused and unwanted prescription drugs out of the hands of children, out of the drinking water system, and assure that they are safely disposed of.

We will be participating in this program, as we do 24 hours per day every day of the year, by the use of our unwanted prescription drug drop off box on the Police Department Lobby at any time. Some Reminders from the Federal Emergency Management Agency During Storm Season

Keep Your Cool in Hot Weather

Summer is in full swing and temperatures are heating up across the nation. According to the [National Weather Service](#) (NWS), heat is one of the leading causes of weather-related deaths in the United States, resulting in hundreds of fatalities each year and even more heat-related illnesses such as heat stroke, heat cramps, and heat exhaustion.

The best line of defense against these illnesses is prevention. The [Ready](#) Campaign offers the following tips to stay safe when the mercury rises:

- Stay indoors as much as possible and limit exposure to the sun;
- Stay on the lowest level out of the sun if air conditioning is unavailable;
- Eat well-balanced, light, and regular meals;
- Dress in loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothes that cover as much skin as possible; and
- Avoid doing strenuous work outside during the warmest part of the day.

When necessary, NWS issues heat-related alerts to help you prepare for extreme weather conditions. To learn more about these alerts and how they impact you, visit: www.nws.noaa.gov/om/heat/ww.shtml

Know Your Alerts & Warnings

Receiving timely information about emergencies can make all the difference in knowing when to take action to protect yourself and your family. Local police and fire departments, emergency managers, the National Weather Service, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Federal Communications Commission, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration work together to make sure you can receive alerts and warnings quickly through several different technologies no matter where you are.

If you've ever noticed a unique sound and vibration coming from your cell phone, you probably just received a [Wireless Emergency Alert](#) (WEA) - a nationwide emergency alert system notifying you of a pending emergency in your area. These messages provide information about extreme weather, local emergencies, AMBER Alerts™, and Presidential Alerts during a national emergency.

WEAs look like a text message and show the type and time of the alert, any action you should take, and the agency issuing the alert. If you receive a WEA, follow the directions advised by the message and seek additional information from local media or authorities. (continued on next page)

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Carbon Monoxide Safety during Power Outages

According to the [National Weather Service](#), carbon monoxide poisoning is a leading cause of death after storms in areas experiencing power outages. Using alternative sources of power can cause carbon monoxide to build up in your home and poison your family. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas created by burning fuel when using portable generators, gas ranges, burning wood, or by running your car.

While deaths occur each year in the U.S. from accidental carbon monoxide poisoning, this tragedy is preventable. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention offers these [tips for staying safe](#) when the power goes out:

- Never use a generator inside your home or garage, even if the doors and windows are open;
- Keep generators at least 20 feet from your home;
- Install battery-operated or battery back-up carbon monoxide detectors near every sleeping area in your home; and
- Check detectors every six months to be sure they are working properly.

The most common symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are headache, dizziness, nausea, and confusion. If you think you are experiencing carbon monoxide poisoning, get fresh air and seek immediate medical attention!

Please remember to lock your doors and use your alarm system. The best defense against crime is a good offense. Please take the initiative to make sure you do not become the victim. Though using your intuition and being aware of your surroundings is a great start, to reinforce the information provided by Investigator Jones, using other tools available is often necessary to assure you remain safe and do not become a victim.

During recent Town Commission meetings security and safety have been a topic of discussion. As part of the discussions, those present in the audience were reminded that the Town of Ocean Ridge has an excellent safety record, and through its Police Department, Town Hall, Maintenance Department, and code compliance/enforcement efforts, strives to maintain a safe and pleasant small town environment for our residents to enjoy.

That being said, I would like to remind everyone of some of the services that are available to help maintain the safe environment we all enjoy and desire.



Volunteers Needed

Your Anthrax Committee needs volunteers to distribute antibiotics on the remote chance that the Town of Ocean Ridge is exposed to an aerosolized airborne anthrax event. No special knowledge is required. All that is required is attendance at about two hours of meetings per year.

Aerosolized Airborne Anthrax is a bioterrorist weapon. Unfortunately, there have been several anthrax episodes in the United States, including one fatal attack in Palm Beach County in 2001. While death occurs in 50% to virtually all exposed individuals, the disease can be prevented by rapid administration of appropriate antibiotics. It is strongly recommended that everyone be provided and take these antibiotics for his/her protection against exposure.

The Town of Ocean Ridge has signed an Agreement with the Florida Department of Health in Palm Beach County who will provide the needed antibiotics at no cost, as part of a program under the auspices of the Center for Disease and Prevention. We will be a dispensing site for our community. Our own trained and credentialed resident-volunteers will perform the necessary dispensing duties. (In absence of this Agreement other will have to line up at large public dispersal centers.)

You are urgently requested to sign up as a volunteer to assist with this challenge. We plan to have a Training Update very soon and would like to get as many of our residents as possible to share in this important program.


