Tax Appeal Deadline

As Chairman of the Palm Beach County Value Adjustment Board (VAB), I want to remind everyone that Sept. 17 is the deadline to file challenges to your property tax market value or classification. Be aware, though, that a newly enacted state law requires taxpayers who file VAB petitions to pay all non-ad valorem taxes and at least 75% of their ad valorem taxes, even if they file a challenge (refundable with interest, if you prevail). Taxpayers have three (3) options to file VAB petitions:

On the clerk's Web site (<http://www.mypalmbeachclerk.com/>) using myVAB
In person, at the Clerk's Governmental Center or branch locations

By mail, to 301 N. Olive Ave., Room 203, West Palm Beach, Fla. 33401

Petition forms for those who choose not to use the online myVAB option are available from the Clerk's office, the Property Appraiser, and the Florida Department of Revenue's Web sites.

Budget Update

At the September 10th Regular Town Commission meeting the Commission approved a Tentative Budget in the amount of \$5,273,606 for the 2012-13 Operating Fund, with a Tentative Millage of \$5.5400, and announced that the computer millage rate is 7.41% more than the Roll Back Rate of \$5.1578.

The Final Budget Adoption meeting is scheduled for September 25, 2012 at 5:01pm and will be held in the commission chambers.

Phishing

As this month's list of Criminal Activity will attest, Ocean Ridge and Briny Breezes residents are not immune to the efforts of some to obtain personal information for fraudulent purposes. Such solicitation can come in many forms; i.e.: the "friendly" phone call, email, letter, etc. Regardless, any unexpected contact should be considered suspicious and immediately terminated. Even on-duty members of the Police Department and Town Hall staff have been targets of such criminal efforts. Likewise, so have members of other Government offices and the Military.

Attached is a flyer that describes one method of "Phishing"; the unsolicited email attempt to gain information and/or access computer files. Please be aware that sophisticated criminals have found a new twist to the old adage: "The pen is mightier than the sword!". They no longer need to use a gun to rob you of your most precious possession - your identity - when they can simply use the phone, a computer or your trash to get the info to file a false credit application or a fake Income Tax return. Tropical Storm Isaac

The weekend of August 25-27 provided another example of the unpredictability of Mother Nature. A weather event that was supposed to only impact the west coast of Florida ended up causing in excess of \$80 Million in damage to Palm Beach County.

The good news for Ocean Ridge was our storm water pumping systems worked. The biggest inconvenience was the loss of electricity in 2 sections of Town. To the credit of many of our residents, what could have been an even greater problem was averted because - since June - they have been trimming their trees and vegetation away from power and utility lines. Both of the areas where power was lost were the result of downed limbs.

Hurricane season does not end until November 30th and many of the major storms have occurred late in the season. So, please continue to monitor your property and take the necessary steps to ensure you and your neighbors are safe and free of the hassle created by the loss of power, phone and/or cable.

There's an App for That!

Speaking of storms and other emergencies, Palm Beach County Commission Vice Chair Steve Abrams provided the following information:

The county has recently introduced a new smartphone app, PBC DART (Palm Beach County Disaster Assessment and Resource Tool). It's a free download that provides lots of helpful info concerning emergencies (i.e. hurricanes).

PBC DART allows residents to identify if they live in an evacuation zone, locate the nearest shelter, and permits residents to report damage to their home or business in the immediate aftermath of a disaster. Damage reports will help emergency managers get an immediate Countywide "picture" within hours of a disaster event to help prioritize response efforts. The application is an additional outreach method to keep the public safe and informed before, during, and after disasters.

PBC DART is available for immediate download at no charge from Apple's iTunes Store and the Android Google Market. For additional information on emergency management programs visit www.pbcgov.com/dem where you will find a section dedicated to hurricane preparedness.

Hopefully you will never have to use this app but it's just another tool in our ever-changing tech world that will provide additional assistance and information, which as many of us know is extremely important under emergency situations such as hurricanes.

The Hook

The hook is a malicious website designed to look and feel like a legitimate website. The authentic-looking website asks the victim to disclose privacy-related information, such as user identification and password. Often the hook is an obfuscated URL that is very close to one the victim finds legitimate and is really a site under the attacker's control.

The Lure

The lure is an enticement delivered through email. The email contains a message encouraging the recipient to follow an included hypertext link. The hyperlink often masks a spoofed uniform resource locator (URL) of a legitimate website.

The Catch

The catch is when the originator of the phishing message uses the information collected from the hook to masquerade as the victim and conduct illegal financial transactions.



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Today, more than ever, spear phishing attacks are focusing on national security targets and our federal users. For this reason, it is important to understand how to identify a phishing email and what steps to take to prevent identity theft, unauthorized system access, or mission compromise.

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PHISHING WARFARE

EXECUTIVE HANDOUT



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Phishing is largely a criminal activity employing social-engineering tactics to defraud Internet users of sensitive information and steal credentials, money and/or identities. A phishing attack begins with a spoofed email masquerading as trustworthy electronic correspondence that contains hijacked brand names of banks, credit card companies, or e-commerce sites. The language of a phishing email is misleading and persuasive by generating either fear or excitement to ultimately lure the recipient to a fraudulent Web site.

Spear Phishing is an e-mail spoofing fraud attempt that targets a specific organizations and users, seeking unauthorized access to confidential data. Spear phishing attempts are not typically initiated by "random hackers" but are more likely to be conducted by organized perpetrators out for



financial gain, trade secrets, or national security information. As with the e-mail messages used in regular phishing expeditions, spear phishing messages appear to come from a trusted source.

Whaling is a spear phishing attempt to target Senior Executives/Leadership (i.e. the big fish).



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Whaling is targeted at Senior Executives and other high profile targets



Spear Phishing is a message sent to a select group of people or a single individual



Phishing is a message sent to a large group of people, usually without any affiliation

What could be the Technical and Operational Impact?

In 2010, during a joint military exercise sponsored by a functional Combatant Command, a service Red Team (as part of their exercise pre-positioning phase), identified 190 potential targets (first name, last name, and military ranks). The Red Team deduced, selected, and targeted 7 user e-mail accounts with 1 phishing email. The phishing e-mail was neither digitally signed nor encrypted and contained malicious code attached to a Microsoft Excel file. 2 of 7 targeted users clicked the phishing email.

This set forth a spiral of events that allowed the Red Team to establish connections, steal files, capture data, and remotely execute commands of their choosing. The Red Team eventually achieved Domain Admin Privileges over more than 6,800 user accounts, 5,400 computer accounts, and all associated password hashes. The detrimental impact on the technical and operational capabilities of the organization to perform its mission was high (high impact to the confidentiality and integrity of information systems and networks).

Florida 511 Provides Time-saving Traffic Information for Ocean Ridge

The Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) bilingual Florida 511 Traveler Information System provides traffic information for Ocean Ridge residents on all of Florida's interstates, including I-95, toll roads and many other metropolitan roadways. Travelers can call 511, visit FL511.com, register for My Florida 511 personalized services or download the 511 app on [iTunes](#) for traffic updates, including crashes, congestion, construction and emergency evacuation information. FL511.com features the same traffic information as the phone call, along with hundreds of traffic cameras.

By registering for My Florida 511 personalized services at FL511.com, users can hear traffic updates and travel times on their custom routes first when calling 511. Additionally, users can register to receive traffic alerts on these routes via a phone call, e-mail and/or text message. Travelers can customize their alerts based on time of day, day of the week and type or severity of incidents.

Twitter users can now learn about roadway conditions through FDOT's FL511 Southeast Twitter account and 11 other FL511 regional and major roadway accounts that distribute traffic information from the 511 Traveler Information System. The Twitter accounts are updated through an automated feed from SunGuide, the software that updates the 511 system statewide.

The 511 system is available from cell phones and landlines; however, standard cell phone minutes may apply. All travelers should check 511 before traveling, have a passenger check 511 or pull over to avoid distracted driving.

Sea Turtle Nesting

Sea turtles are currently classified as "endangered" and "threatened"

Did you know Palm Beach County beaches are some of the most densely nested beaches by sea turtles in the nation? Nesting on our beaches begin as early as March by three different species of sea turtles, including the loggerhead, green and leatherback. Early nesters are usually leatherbacks with the more numerous loggerheads arriving in significant numbers in May. Nesting continues through August and tapers off in early September.

The female sea turtle crawls ashore at night to dig a nest, deposit her eggs, cover the nest and return to the water. While on the beach, sea turtles are timid and vulnerable and can be easily frightened away if disturbed. It takes between one to three hours for the female turtle to lay between 80-120 ping pong ball-sized eggs.

The nests are located approximately 18 inches below the surface, and are generally found above the high tide line on the dry beach. Eggs and nest must remain undisturbed in the warm sand for 47-60 days before they hatch.

The majority of the hatching occurs in July through September and hatchlings usually emerge from their nests as a group at night. In a natural situation, they crawl down the beach to the water where they must swim for many hours to reach the open sea.

Unfortunately, thousands of hatchlings die every year in their attempt to reach the water. Instinctively, sea turtles follow the natural light reflected on the water by the moon. However, they become disoriented by artificial light (i.e., residential, commercial, street, cars, etc.)

and die from exhaustion, dehydration and predators.

The county's Environmental Resource Management has a number of researchers, volunteer groups and agencies monitoring sea turtle nesting. Recent findings reported a 40% increase in loggerhead sea turtle nesting in a number of area beaches. Disorientation reports (due to artificial lighting) are increasing and staff is currently conducting night-time lighting surveys to notify coastal property owners of non-compliant lights.

Tips on How To Help Sea Turtles Survive

- Do not disturb or handle sea turtles, their eggs or their nests. All are violations of state and federal laws.
- Report all dead, injured or stranded turtles and hatchlings or anyone harassing them to 1-888-404-3922 (Florida Fish & Wildlife).
- Prevent all lights from illuminating or being visible from the beach including security lights, balcony and porch lights, flashlights and car headlights.
- Reduce litter and marine debris by disposing of your trash properly and picking up beach debris.

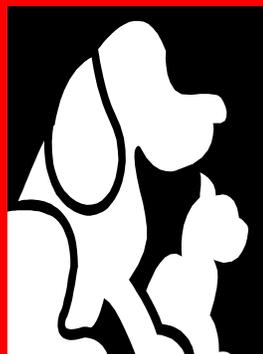
