his week, Town Hall mailed the annual garbage/trash and alarm bills to our residents for the fiscal year 2012/13. The new garbage/trash rate is \$225 for single family and \$157.50 per unit for multi-family. The alarm annual rate increased to \$200 with user fee of \$2.00.

Election Information

From PBC Commissioner Steven Abrams

wanted to pass on some helpful information concerning the upcoming November election. In addition to the candidates, the ballot has multiple pages dedicated to 14 state and local amendments, which are wordy and sometimes complex. Here is a simplified overview of the ballot amendments, including who is supporting or opposing them and any potential budgetary impacts.

In an effort to make the voting process easier, registered voters can go online to request a ballot and vote by mail. Visit http:// www.pbcelections.org/items.aspx?id=28 to complete a quick and easy form that can be submitted online requesting a ballot by mail (which will take approximately one week). Once received, the ballot can be completed at your convenience and returned by mail or in person at one of the four elections offices around the county. For my south county constituents, the Delray Supervisor of Elections office, located at 345 S. Congress Avenue in Delray Beach, is very accessible.

Plus, you can track your mail-in ballot online at http://registration.election.myflorida.com/ CheckVoterStatus to confirm that your vote has been counted!

As you know, voting is an important and valuable right that we have, and I encourage everyone to vote in the upcoming election.

Miami Dolphins Cycling Challenge (D.C.C.)

Ust in case our November Newsletter is published late, we wanted to announce that on Saturday, November 3 and Sunday, November 4, 2012 the Miami Dolphins will be sponsoring their third annual two-day bicycling event that will travel between Sun Life Stadium in Miami Gardens and City Place in West Palm Beach. Saturday's ride is 100 miles long and Sunday's route will cover 70 miles. This is a fundraising event with the proceeds going to cancer research at the University of Miami's Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center. The previous two rides raised a total of over \$1.6 Million.

The D.C.C. is modeled after the Pan-Massachusetts Challenge, the most successful athletic fundraiser in America; which has raised over \$300,000,000 for cancer research and care in the last 33 years.

The ride will travel thru Ocean Ridge and Briny Breezes on A1A on both days. As of this writing, the plan anticipates the riders will be in our area during the following periods:

- On Saturday, Nov 3 between 10:15 AM 3:30 PM, with a designated water stop at Ocean Front Park.
- On Sunday, Nov 4 between 8:30 AM 10:30 AM

- * Any unsolicited visitors offering to perform services or attempting to sell products should be denied access to your home.
- * IMMEDIATELY report any suspicious activity to the Police.

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KNOW THE RULES ...

Halloween Safety Tips

- 1. Instruct your older children to TAKE FRIENDS when "Trick or Treating."
- 2. Make sure a TRUSTED ADULT, an older child, or you accompany your younger children when "Trick or Treating." A trusted adult is a person parents/guardians have come to rely on and with whom they and their children feel comfortable. Discuss with your child who will accompany him or her and make sure you are both comfortable with the choice.
- 3. Accompany, or make sure a trusted adult accompanies, your younger children to the door of every home they approach. Become familiar with each home your child visits and the people who are providing Halloween treats to your children.
- 4. Teach your children to only enter homes with your prior permission and only approach homes that are well-lit both inside and outside.
- Teach your children to NEVER approach a vehicle unless they are accompanied by you, even if it appears no one is inside the vehicle.
- 6. Make sure your children wear reflective clothing and carry a flashlight or glow stick when traveling during the evening hours.
- 7. Make sure your children are able to see and breathe properly and easily when using facial masks. All costumes and masks should be clearly marked as flame resistant.
- 8. Teach your children to always stay in well-lit areas, never take shortcuts, and never go into isolated areas.
- Teach your children to stay alert for any suspicious incidents and report anything unusual to you and/or law enforcement.
- Teach your children if anyone tries to grab them to draw attention to themselves and loudly yell "This person is trying to take me," or "This person is not my father/mother." Instruct your children to make every effort to escape by walking, running, or pulling away; yelling; kicking; attracting attention; and/or otherwise resisting.
- 11. Consider organizing or attending parties at home, in schools, or in community centers as a good alternative to "Trick or Treating."

Halloween Safety Tips

No Scaredy Cats This Halloween: Top 10 Safety Tips for Pet Parents

Attention, companion animal caretakers! The ASPCA would like to point out these common-sense cautions that'll help keep your pets safe and stress-free this time of year. If you do suspect your pet has ingested a potentially dangerous substance, please call your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center at (888) 426-4435.

- No tricks, no treats: That bowlful of candy is for trick-or-treaters, not for Scruffy and Fluffy.
 - Chocolate in all forms—especially dark or baking chocolate—can be very dangerous for dogs and cats. Symptoms of significant chocolate ingestion may include vomiting, diarrhea, hyperactivity, increased thirst, urination and heart rate—and even seizures.




- Candies containing the artificial sweetener xylitol can be poisonous to dogs. Even small amounts of xylitol
 sweetener can cause a sudden drop in blood sugar, which leads to depression, lack of coordination and
 seizures. In cases of significantly low blood sugar, liver failure has been known to occur.
- Ingesting tin foil and cellophane candy wrappers can pose a choking hazard or cause intestinal blockage.
- Popular Halloween plants such as pumpkins and decorative corn are considered to be relatively nontoxic, yet they can produce gastrointestinal upset should pets ingest them. Intestinal blockage could even occur if large pieces are swallowed.
- Keep wires and cords from electric lights and other decorations out of reach of your pets. If chewed, your pet could experience damage to his mouth from shards of glass or plastic, or receive a possibly life-threatening electrical shock.
- 4. A carved pumpkin certainly is festive, but do exercise extreme caution if you choose to add a candle. Pets can easily knock a lit pumpkin over and cause a fire. Curious kittens especially run the risk of getting burned or singed by candle flames.
- 5. Dress-up can be a big mess-up for some pets. Please don't put your dog or cat in a costume UNLESS you know he or she loves it (yup, a few pets are real hams!). For pets who prefer their "birthday suits," however, wearing a costume can cause undue stress.
- 6. If you do dress up your pet, make sure the costume isn't annoying or unsafe. It should not constrict the animal's movement or hearing, or impede his ability to breathe, bark or meow. Also try on costumes before the big night. If your pet seems distressed, allergic or shows abnormal behavior, consider letting him go au naturel or donning a festive bandana.
