

Criminal Activity

Soliciting on the Rise

As the above list of Criminal Activity shows, the annual migration of solicitors has begun. The colder weather in the North has driven these folks to our more temperate climate. As a result, folks have been going door-to-door soliciting funds for magazine subscriptions, sports teams (lacrosse, "Irish" soccer, baseball, etc.), and other causes.

The good news is residents have been calling the Police Department to report these visitors and/or suspicious persons, and these calls are greatly appreciated. Our initial response was to meet with & identify the violators, issue them & their company warnings and, as long as they did not have a warrant, send them on their way. After a week, it was apparent that a stronger message was needed so arrests began. Since that date, we have not had any similar complaints. We had the same result last year after we started making arrests.

It is important to note that our investigations determined that several of these folks have warrants and/or criminal histories, and their companies have had numerous Better Business Bureau complaints filed against them.

Soliciting without a Permit is a Town Code violation. So, please continue to call us when you encounter or observe suspicious persons. Your continued support is greatly appreciated.

Water Restrictions Modified, NOT Eliminated!

Effective 11/10/11 the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) modified the water restrictions in our area. Contrary to rumor, the restrictions were not eliminated. In addition, on Sunday, 11/06/11 the seasonal time change occurred (clocks turned back one hour). As a result, we have experienced an increase in observed water violations. Therefore, a friendly reminder is in order.



We have returned to the 3-day a week watering plan:

- Odd-numbered addresses can water on Mondays, Wednesdays and/or Saturdays.
- Even-numbered addresses can water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and/or Sundays.
- There is no watering on Fridays.
- There is no watering any days between 10:00 AM – 4:00 PM.

The Geo-Cast Phone System

What were those strange, recorded phone calls you received on 11/18/11 and 11/24/11?

In an effort to expand the way we keep residents informed, Town Hall and the Police Department will expand our use of the auto-dialer phone system that we subscribe to via the Palm Beach County Office of Emergency Management. As a result, you may receive a recorded alert that begins: “Standby for a message from your local government!” followed by a request to push a number on your keypad to obtain the full message.

On 11/18/11 and 11/24/11 the message was to remind residents to test their burglar/fire alarm systems; especially if they recently modified their telephone service by converting to any of the Voice-over-IP products, such as: Xfinity, U-verse, Magic Jack, Vonage, etc. In addition, we suggested that everyone take this time to change the battery in their smoke detectors.

Should you receive such a phone call, please take the time to listen to the message and take the appropriate action.



End of Another Hurricane Season

November 30th marks the end of the Hurricane Season. Our area was once again spared from any major storms. Unfortunately, we cannot become complacent as these events are more of a “when” than an “if”. So, as we approach the start of next year’s season (June 1), enjoy the calmer weather.

“Tis the Season”

This is the time of year when traffic increases and drivers are easily distracted by thoughts of visiting family & friends, shopping, and the sights & sounds of the holidays. Extra care needs to be taken to avoid being involved in an incident that will negatively impact the spirit of the season.

Here are a few reminders:

- “Drive Sober or get pulled over” – need I say more?
- “Move Over! It’s the Law” – when approaching any emergency vehicle, move over one lane or slow down.
- “Buckle Up, Florida!” – wear your seatbelt, and make sure everyone does.
- “Slow Down” – are you really saving that much time by exceeding the speed limit?
- “Distracted Driving” – pay attention! Cell phone use, texting, or even fumbling with the CD player or radio can be enough to create a lapse in attention that results in tragedy.

Energy2Save Reduces Energy; Saves Money Rebate Program Launches Dec. 12

Do you have old, energy-draining products that you can never seem to find the time to replace? On Dec. 12, the Municipal Energy Conservation Coalition (MECC) is making it easier and less expensive for you through an Energy Conservation Rebate Program. The Program, called Energy2Save, is designed to raise awareness and help motivate you and our community to take action on energy conservation practices that reduce greenhouse gases and energy use.

Rebates, and the associated rebate amounts, will be provided for the replacement and installation of the following items:

Programmable Thermostat	Up to \$30
Air conditioning unit	\$125 to \$2,100
Air ducts	Up to \$154
Insulation	Up to \$300
Solar Water Heater	Up to \$1,000
Reflective Roof Covering	Up to \$325

But there is even more good news. Qualifying residents that are approved through the Florida Power & Light Rebate Program may be eligible to receive additional rebate money. However, the combined rebate amount may not exceed the total cost paid for the product.

How does it work?

Beginning Dec. 12, you may complete and submit an application through the Energy2Save.com website. You may also download an application and mail it to the location indicated on the application. Before you apply, make sure you read the qualifications to be sure that you are eligible. After your application is approved, you may purchase and install one of the energy efficient products. After installation, you must submit the required documentation within the appropriate timeframe and your rebate will be mailed to you. It's that simple!

Other restrictions apply, but the minimum requirements include:

- Must own and reside in a single-family home, townhouse, or condo, within the program area where the energy efficient product will be installed.
- Must be a Florida Power and Light (FPL) account holder at the residents that you are installing the rebate products.
- Application must be **completed, submitted and approved** before the applicant may purchase the energy efficient product for which they wish to seek a rebate.
- Applicant is solely responsible for the purchase and installation of rebate-eligible products and all related parts, permits, equipment, and adherence to all building codes, deed restrictions, homeowner's association organization restrictions, and other applicable ordinances, codes and restrictions.
- Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis, and are subject to the availability of funds, or until the program is terminated.

MECC is a partnership comprised of the Towns of Lantana, Ocean Ridge, Haverhill, Palm Beach Shores and the City of Atlantis. The program is funded through a grant provided by the State Energy Efficiency Conservation.

Recipes

Recipe: Melting Snowmen Cookie Balls

Ingredients

1pkg. (8oz) cream cheese, softened
24 Nutter Butter cookies, finely crushed (about 3 cups)
2pkgs Baker's White Chocolate, melted
1/4c creamy peanut butter
48 mini OREO bite sized cookies
2 tbsp decorative icing

Directions

Mix cream cheese and cookie crumbs until well blended. Shape into 48 (1-inch) balls and place a single layer in a shallow pan. Freeze 10 mins. Mix chocolate and peanut butter until well blended. Dip balls in chocolate mixture; place in shallow waxed paper-lined pan, allowing excess chocolate to pool at bottom of each ball. Decorate with remaining ingredients as shown in photo. Refrigerate one hour or until firm. Keep refrigerated.

Ingredients:

1/2lb pancetta slices
3 honey crisp apples
1oz lemon juice
4oz seasoned crumbled goat cheese
freshly ground black pepper
honey for drizzle

Directions:

Place pancetta slices on a foil-lined baking sheet in a single layer. Bake 10-12 minutes until browned, curled and crisped; drain on paper towel, set aside. Slice apple rounds about 1/8-inch thick, remove seed pieces. Sprinkle apple slices with lemon juice to prevent from turning brown. Place one pancetta slice in center of apple, sprinkle with goat cheese. Top with freshly ground cracked black pepper then drizzle lightly with a good quality honey. Arrange on platter.

KNOW THE RULES...

SAFETY TIPS FOR THE HOLIDAYS

1. When in a public facility always supervise your children, and **ALWAYS** accompany young children to the restroom. Make certain your children know to stay with you at all times while shopping and always **CHECK FIRST** with you or a trusted adult before they go anywhere. It is important to know where your children are and who they are with at all times.
2. If older children become separated from you while holiday shopping, have them meet you in a predesignated spot such as the sales counter of the store you were in or the mall's information booth. Teach younger children to look for people who may be sources of help within the store or mall such as a uniformed law-enforcement or security officer, store salesperson with a nametag, person with a nametag who is working in the information booth, or mother with children. They should stay close to where they first became separated and **NEVER** leave the store/mall or go to the parking lot to look for you or your vehicle.
3. Make an outing to a mall a "teachable" experience in which children practice checking with you; locating the adults who may be able to help if they need assistance; and, for older children, going to the restroom with a friend. Practice having them **CHECK FIRST** with you before going anywhere within a mall or store. Remember, allowing your children to wear clothing or carry items in public on which their name is displayed may bring about unwelcome attention from inappropriate people looking for a way to start a conversation with your children.
4. Parents and guardians should not leave children alone at public facilities such as video arcades, movie theaters, or playgrounds as a convenient "babysitter" while they are holiday shopping. Never leave children in toy or specialty stores expecting store personnel to supervise and care for your children. They are not trained in this role, and it is not a function of their employment.
5. If you allow your older children to go to the mall or other activities without you, they should **TAKE A FRIEND**. It's more fun and much safer. Older children should check-in with you on a regular basis while they are out. Make certain a clear plan is in place to pick them up including where, what time, and what to do in case of a change in plans.
6. Nothing takes the place of your supervision when you are in a public place with your children. If you are going holiday shopping and feel you will be distracted, make other arrangements for the care of your children. It's easy to get distracted with all the sights, sounds, and crowds of holiday shopping, so make certain your children stay with you at all times.

We have so many wonderful options. There are a wide range of cultural opportunities, beautiful beaches, professional sports, world-class golf, equestrian competitions, fabulous dining and great shopping.

Whether you live here year round or for the season, if you're like me, you're probably creating your holiday gift list. That means property taxes are probably the last thing on your mind. That's ok because you have until March 31 to pay. I just want to remind you that there is a 3 percent discount for December payments. The money you save could help with those shopping bills!

This is our busiest season of the year. I encourage you to consider paying your property taxes online. If you prefer to visit a service center, we have convenient drop boxes so you don't have to wait in line. If you mail your payment, please include your Property Control Number(s) on your check along with the bill coupon. Please do not use staples, clips or return address labels. The high speed processor rejects envelopes with any of these items.



From the desk of Commissioner Steven L. Abrams



The holiday season is upon us. While it is a wonderful time of year, it is also important that we stay alert and be reminded that not everyone's intentions are good during the holidays. The following are some cautionary reminders and general consumer information that will keep you better informed and safe all year round.

Parking/Shopping

Park in a well-lighted area and lock all doors.
Store valuables in the trunk and out of sight.
Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious persons or activity.
Ask for assistance from store security to escort you to your vehicle if you don't feel safe.
Avoid carrying large amounts of cash or wearing expensive jewelry.
Always carry identification with you.
Stay in groups (safety in numbers).

Retailer Return Policies

Be aware of the store's return policy in advance. Florida law does *not* require businesses to accept merchandise returns.

All retailers are required to post their return policies. If no policy is posted, state law allows consumers to return the merchandise within 7 days of the sale with a receipt (unless it is perishable, custom made or removed from its original packaging).

Regardless of store policy, merchandise can be returned if a sales person misrepresented the product or it was found to be defective.

On-line Purchases

Be sure the business is reliable/established (make sure their web site provides detailed information on their location, etc.). Check the Consumer Affairs web site (www.pbcgov.org/consumer) for registered complaints.

Be aware of additional shipping costs and understand the process for returning merchandise.

The Federal Trade Commission's "Mail or Telephone Order Shopping Rule" requires merchants to meet the agreed delivery time for a product or deliver it within 30 days if there is no specific agreed time. If the company cannot meet the timeframe, it must notify the consumer of the new date and provide an option to cancel the order with a full refund. No product substitution is permitted without the consumer's permission.

Please, Protect Your Cat or Kitten Against Deadly Virus - Panleukopenia

There have been an increased number of cats and kittens diagnosed with panleukopenia, more commonly called "panleuk," throughout Palm Beach County. This unfortunate disease can affect cats young and old.

Panleukopenia is a very contagious illness that can be passed on from cat to cat; this illness is not a threat to humans. Symptoms to look for include diarrhea, vomiting, lethargy, fever, and sudden death. If your cat or kitten is displaying any of the above signs or doesn't appear to be feeling well, schedule an appointment with your veterinarian right away.

Sadly, some of the cats and kittens at Palm Beach County Animal Care and Control (PBCACC) have recently been exposed which is why they would like to remind you about the importance of keeping your pets up-to-date on all necessary vaccinations in order to keep them happy and healthy. PBCACC now offers a Three-in-One (RCP) vaccination and de-worming package for cats/kittens over 8 weeks of age, at a cost of \$30. Vaccine packages are offered during regular business hours on a walk-in basis.

Talk to your veterinarian about the best protection plan for your pet. Need a veterinarian? Check with the Palm Beach Veterinary Society for a certified veterinarian in your area.


